#### NKC Snake Parade and Festival

For approaching 20 years, families by the thousands have journeyed to NORTH KANSAS CITY for the annual Snake Parade and Festival (Friday and Saturday, March 12-13). Always, you can catch the tempting aroma of fresh barbecue, and hear the music and joyous shouts of children even before the Parade begins.

Featured are carnival and pony rides, a petting zoo, race car exhibits, stage productions, even a barbecue cook-off especially for charities. Thanks to so many generous sponsors, virtually everything is free, including parking. The purpose of this spectacular event, says cofounder Mickey Finn, is "to bring fun and pleasure to families and help organizations that help Northlanders."

It is the parade itself that meas-

ures the heart of this small but vibrant city (pop. 4700). Over the years, \$450,000 has been awarded to charities and other non-profit groups competing in the Parades various categories. Last year, prizes exceeding \$57,000 went to 10 charities and 28 educational/youth/service organizations.

In 1995, I watched the Mealson-Wheels float consisting of their volunteer drivers pulling little red wagons bearing "lunches" to the homebound. I was hooked. As a frequent float builder, I have come to conclude that we are all doers, dreamers, and perhaps a wee bit pixilated.

Charity float builders become world-class scroungers. On a panhandled flatbed or semi, they create their masterpieces,

usually in unheated sheds or back alleys. Frosted hands and feet are sometimes thawed over cooking grills. (On Parade day, there have been snowflakes and sunburns, but "cancellation" is an unspeakable thought.)

Each year, Parade chairman Suzi Cliff and the dozens of volunteers come up with a fetching theme. Creativity then blossoms throughout Northland. In 1997, the Clay County Clothes Closet turned "Shamrock and Roll" into a cave shoe factory with leprechauns making footwear for the needy to the tune of Elvis "Blue Suede Shoes." The "Irish River Dance" became a community "Big Mo Hoedown" for NNI, while the Winnetonka Band parents presented an orchestra tableau because "If Theres No Band. Theres No Dance!"

The 1992 "Irish Shenanigans" theme became an open-air classroom where Concerned Care students were being schooled in "Outhouse Tipping 101."

The cash prize is important, but the chance "to get out the word about your charity group is the main thing," said longtime Meals-on-Wheels volunteer Harry Vanderford (who turns 100 on March 1).

In thanking North Kansas City for their gifts to so many, veteran float-maker Carolyn Clinesmith put it this way: "We are all winners. Weve built friendships that will last long after the Parade is over. Its not only the prize money that makes it all worthwhile, but the

that matters most."

This years theme is "An Irish Birthday Celebration." Whether St. Patrick gave his people a snake-free environment is problematic. But certain it is that you of Northtown have enriched us all. On this, Snake Saturdays 20th anniversary, we congratulate you!

Under NNI by-laws, members are defined as organized and active neighborhood associations that hold open meetings, have submitted a written request for membership, and have been admitted for membership by vote of the NNI board.

If you have received the form but not yet completed it, please do so today. Neighborhood associations and block clubs that return the forms will receive an official NNI Member certificate.
