Coming soon to a neighborhood near you: Briarcliff-Winnwood area planning to begin July 8


▼he Briarcliff-Winnwood Area Plan will officially launch at a July 8 community meeting at Golden Oaks **Education Center, 3100 NE** 46th Street, from 6 to 8 p.m. The plan area encompasses 18 square miles of Kansas City's Northland, from Pleasant Valley Road and the city limits of Gladstone on the north to Missouri Highway 210 and the City of North Kansas City on the south, and from the western city limits at Briarcliff to the east side of the I-435 corridor. When completed, the plan will serve as a guide for future development, land use, neighborhoods, housing, transportation and infrastructure improvements.

As with other community planning initiatives, the BW plan will be a hybrid of technical urban planning, existing studies and data, and most importantly, input from area residents, institutions and businesses. The consultant team, led by Bucher Willis & Ratliff, brings a wide variety of community planning experience and technical expertise to the project. Their efforts will by supported by Northland Neighborhoods, Inc. and Kansas City's Planning and Development Department.

Planner Kyle Elliott of the City

Planning and Development staff, says the Briarcliff-Winnwood Area Plan comes at a critical time for Kansas City. "We are confronted with a series of major issues, such as opportunities for light rail and mass transit, a massive water and sewer improvement plan, and a 50-year backlog of infrastructure needs in the Northland. The Area Plan will attempt to put these and other issues into a neighborhood framework," Elliott says.

Residents of the Briarcliff-Winnwood project area are urged to participate in the series of community meetings that will provide the grist for the planning team's mill. 
NNI Annual Meeting yields bylaw changes, new and renewing directors

How's this for a "green solution?"

A.B.O.P.T. reaps huge harvest of unwanted stuff.
A.B.O.P.T. (antifreeze, batteries, oil, paint, and tires) scored big on June 7 as hundreds of area residents disposed of that hard-to-get-rid-of stuff in a safe, responsible way.

Here's a run-down of the

harvest: Paper shredded - 4,000 lbs. Metal recycling collected -

3,920 lbs.

Tires collected - 440 (360 auto tires, 52 auto tires on wheels, 13 motorcycle tires, 10 truck tires, 5 mower. Household Hazardous Waste - 6,051 pounds of materials.

The June 7 A.B.O.P.T. was the biggest household hazardous waste clean-up in the history of Kansas City. NNI staff who helped make it so were Janet Shaffer, Gina Hopkins, Christy Harris, Pat Estes, Jenny Ellis, and Lola McCloud. They were assisted by five KCPD officers and 27 volunteers.


