Council members' persistence on Northland roads paying off

Since February 2008, Kansas City Council members Deb Hermann and Bill Skaggs have conducted monthly meetings at NNI to spur progress on Northland transportation projects. The meetings, held on third Tuesdays at 8:30 a.m. at NNI, are paying off for Northland residents.

Key to the success of this "road show" is the presence of highlevel City staff at the meetings. The staff members now know that residents expect progress, not excuses. Councilwoman Hermann sees a dual benefit from the monthly staff updates. "The meetings bring the staff face to face with concerned residents who expect accountability. Accountability triggers action. And the professional staff gets real satisfaction from reporting real progress. It's a win-win," Hermann says.

North Brighton, Chouteau Parkway, Searcy Creek Parkway, Shoal Creek Parkway, and ATA bus service top the list of frequently discussed projects. Delays on the North Brighton project are a major source of irritation for Hermann, Skaggs and impacted residents. While the project is still not complete, the update meetings have kept the City's Capital Improvements Management Office (CIMO) on its toes. CIMO has

now provided a timeline for project completion. The Parks and Recreation Department bought into the update meetings from the beginning, bringing timelines and cost breakdowns for each project.

NNI C.E.O. Jim Rice says the update meetings also provide "Infrastructure 101." "When projects are not moving, residents need to know why. The meetings sometimes reveal bureaucratic bungling, but also allow the staff to explain legitimate delays. Communication can be worth as much as brick

and mortar." Infrastructure always makes the short list of Northland priorities. The Hermann-Skaggs road update meetings are giving order to what has too often been a chaotic capital improvement process in the Northland. So far both residents and staff like the process and the results they have already seen. As Councilwoman Hermann is fond of saying, "If you take the time to build transparency and accountability, results won't be far behind."

Some results from the eight update meetings held so far:

- A flashing traffic signal was installed at 72nd and North Brighton after residents reported problems at one of the meetings.
- Faulty street lights on North Brighton are now being fixed.
- Need for better bus service in neighborhoods. Hermann and Skaggs asked the
 Area Transportation Authority (ATA) to
 send staff to every meeting.

NNI teams with YouthWorks to help Northlanders in need

on YouthWorks volunteers in Kansas City.

They provide life-changing, faith-based youth mission opportunities that are fun, significant and targeted to the needs and capabilities of youth, ages 12 to 19.

From June 16 through August 8, young people dispersed throughout the city to work with children and seniors, paint homes, clean up yards and sort food at pantries. YouthWorks helped NNI and the Cooley Highlands Neighborhood, which was selected because it had neighborhood people to supervise the group and senior

citizens who needed assistance. One group painted 3 seniors' homes, worked at Shoal Creek Living History Museum, cleaned up yards, and performed other minor home improvements. Another YouthWorks crew painted 4 homes, completed yard work on 6 seniors' yards, worked at Shepherd's Center, laid carpet at Avondale Baptist Church, spent 8 days at Pleasant Valley Nursing Home, and worked several days at Shoal Creek Living History Museum. Altogether, 190 YouthWorks volunteers clocked 1,965 hours of service during their summer at NNI.

NNI FOCUS Center offers voter registration and pet licenses

With a mega election coming November 4, be sure you are registered to vote. The process is simple and quick at NNI, but the deadline is October 8, so hurry. You can purchase 3-year pet licenses at NNI in addition to the 1-year licenses NNI has carried in the past. For neutered and spayed pets, 1-year licenses are \$10, 3-year licenses are \$27. You must present a current rabies vaccination certificate and proof of the pet's sterilization. A 3-year rabies vaccination is required for a 3-year license.

Accurso Orchestra with vocalist Ann Atkin to encore at Hillside Christian Church



Light rail plan endorsed by NNI... with reservations

The NNI Board of Directors has endorsed the Light Rail Question on Kansas City's November 4 ballot. At the same time, a number of neighborhood leaders have challenged the Area Transportation Authority (ATA) to come up with a meaningful plan to improve Northland bus service. They note that a light rail line along North Oak will do little good for many Northlanders if they cannot get to North Oak by bus feeder lines or drive to convenient park-and-rides.
