Please vote! It really does matter.

Tuesday, April 3, is Election Day. There are elections happening that will impact virtually every neighborhood in the Northland. Elections that will determine what kind of municipal officials will serve you, what kind of schools your kids will attend, the quality of programs such as trash service, fire and ambulance protection, and libraries.

If you are involved in your neighborhood, I'm probably preaching to the choir when I ask you to vote. Civic involvement at the neighborhood level usually transfers to the duty and privilege of voting. But what about your friends and neighbors who, for whatever reason, sit on the sidelines on Election Day? Here's another slant on why it's important to get out the vote: As a former elected official, I can tell you that strong voter turnout is a sure sign that citizens are watching what elected officials are doing. And they should watch. Ballot issues matter. They deal with taxes, public improvements, health, public safety, and the quality of public education. Strong voter turnout can also mean the difference between excellence or mediocrity in the quality of those elected to serve in public office.

If you aren't registered to vote, it is too late to register In time for the April election, but not too late for the August election where again there will be important issues for the votes to decide.
