



City of Riverside and NNI to join forces on home repair

The City of Riverside is on the move. Fueled by revenues from Argosy Casino, this Platte County community is reinventing itself. In recent years, Riverside has invested in infrastructure and public buildings, and cleared land for major economic development projects. The Riverside Board of Aldermen and the administrative staff now want to bring that same energy to the city's aging neighborhoods with a partnership with Northland Neighborhoods.

On February 20, the Board of Aldermen approved a \$100,000 contract with NNI to bring its Custom Solutions home repair program to Riverside neighborhoods.

“This is a classic win-win situation,” says NNI executive director Jim Rice. “Riverside gets the benefit of our experience and expertise in home repair. NNI gets to expand its services into Platte County and work with a group of visionary elected officials and a smart, high-energy city staff.”

Rice hopes the home repair assignment will lead to other opportunities with Riverside. “Job one is to do the home repair work with skill, efficiency and compassion,” Rice says. “If we do this job right, I’m confident we’ll be involved with other Riverside neighborhood projects. In the meantime, we intend to hit the

ground running on home repair.”

The Custom Solutions program, pioneered by NNI’s James Cianciaruso, provides grants of up to \$5,000 per household for low to moderate-income homeowners for new roofs, windows, siding and other repairs. But home repair is only part of the

Custom Solutions program. The “Custom” part is NNI’s holistic approach to each home repair application. When NNI staff members do an on-site evaluation, they watch for other needs such as

health care, financial counseling, and help with code violations. “We look for underlying problems along with the immediate home repair issue,” Cianciaruso says. “That way, we can help families help themselves.”

HomeWorks workshop debuts at NNI in March; To focus on home maintenance and financial planning

Your home is one of the biggest investments you will ever make. Maintaining and enhancing its value should be a high priority. Once you have purchased your home and moved in, too often you are confronted with the dilemma of how much you need to know to be a capable homeowner. With that in mind, NNI will partner with the University of Missouri Extension this spring to present the “HomeWorks: Maintaining Your Housing Investment” workshop series. This

NNI Board supports school levy and bond issue

At its February 19 meeting, the NNI Board of Directors approved a resolution endorsing the April 3, 2007 North Kansas City School District ballot questions. The measures would authorize a capital improvement bond issue and an operating levy increase.

The NNI resolution pointed out that the quality of education plays a fundamental and central role in the health and stability of residential neighborhoods. NNI is a Partner in Education with the North Kansas City School District.

North Kansas City School District is seeking a 27 cent levy increase to open and operate Staley High School, hire additional K-8 teachers to manage class size across the district, and continue vital safety and maintenance improvements. Question 2 would authorize a \$21 million bond issue to build a new elementary school, upgrade playgrounds and classroom technology, all of which can be accomplished within the district’s current debt capacity without raising taxes.

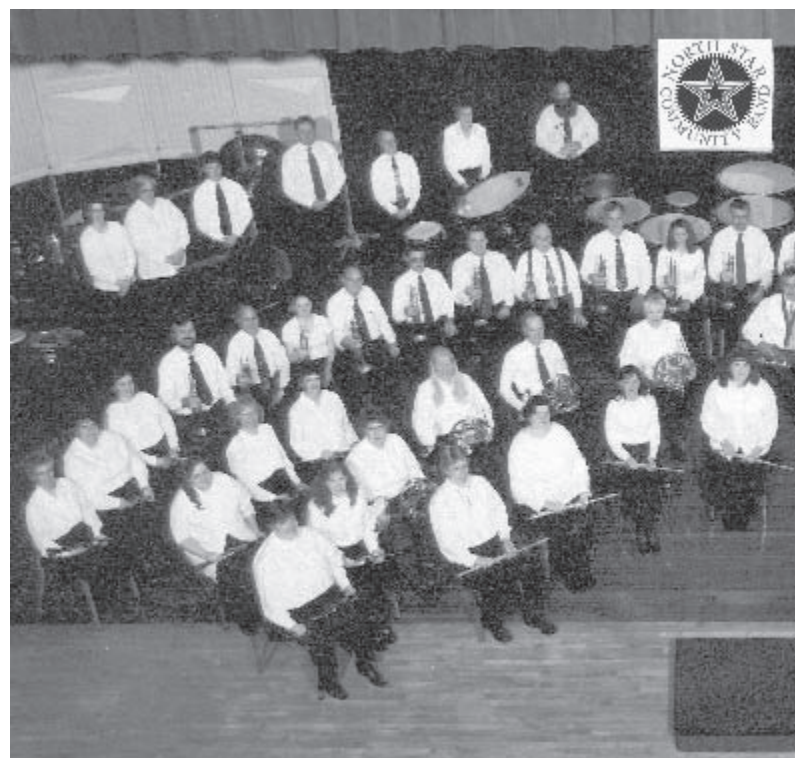
This is the 40th season for the Northland

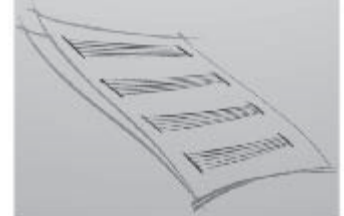

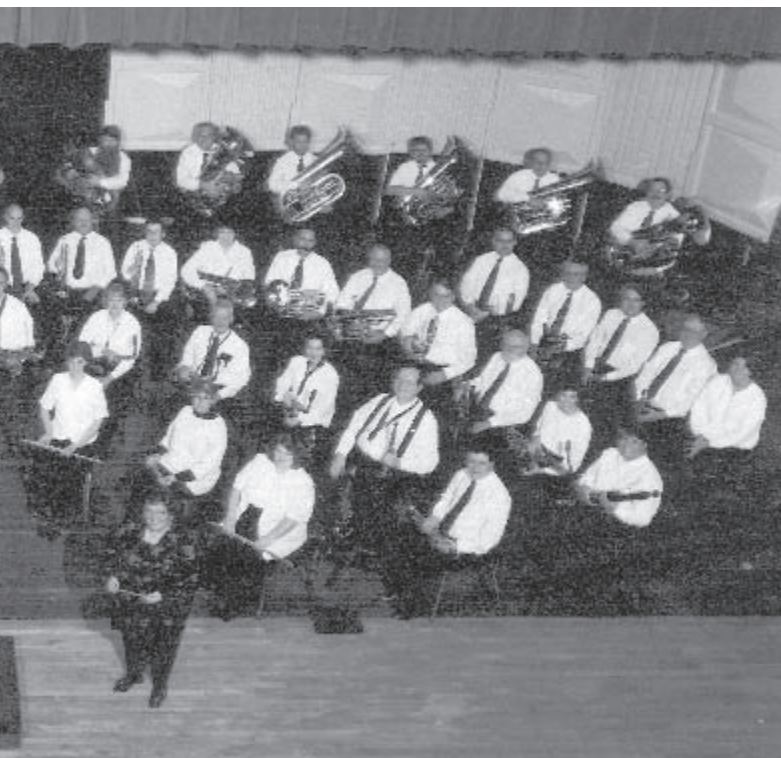

Focus on neighborhoods of the Northland: A Little Bit of History about the Briarcliff Community

The Frank Lloyd Wright House

Master architect Frank Lloyd Wright has been proclaimed one of America's most influential and imaginative architects. His 70-year career ranged from commercial buildings to homes, all with unique design. His career began in the Chicago area with homes bearing his famous "prairie style," but his career soon moved throughout the world with homes in California and a hotel complex in Japan built to withstand earthquakes.

Briarcliff Hills has a major connection to this famed architect who designed one of the homes on the bluff. This home, built in 1956, belonged to Eloise Bott whose husband purchased the land from Sig Brunn. Mr. Brunn, when asked

to recommend the perfect architect, advised the Botts that Mr. Wright would be a natural. Wright accepted the challenge and the plans were completed. It took some two years to build because the topography of the land presented many hurdles. But the home on the bluff of Briarcliff Hills has the honor of being one of the last homes designed by this master architect. The Frank Lloyd Wright home in

Briarcliff Hills has been said to be a living example of excellence in both construction and in craftsmanship.

The home exhibits Frank Lloyd Wright's dislike of doorways and his affinity for built-in cabinets. The kitchen is an area Mr. Wright must have viewed as being used only by the "lady of the house" in that it is very small and compact. Also, the bedroom has many draw-

ers built in, thus eliminating need for additional furniture for storage. The home did have a wine cellar, but it was transformed into a kennel for the present owner's large dogs. When you drive down Briarcliff Road near the end of the bluff, look to your right and you'll see this most unique home. It is truly a masterpiece by a master architect. It is a shining example of his work and Briarcliff Hills is proud to have this site as one of the last he chose to use for his design.

Another example of Mr. Wright's design is Community Christian Church located near the Plaza at 46th and Main Streets. Take a look at this interesting design the next time you are in the Plaza area.

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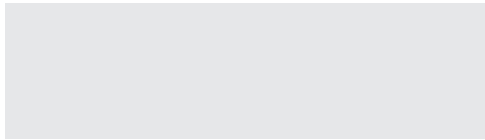
