VIVION ROAD PLAN TAKES CENTER STAGE

Vivion Road occupies a special place among Northland assets. Technically Missouri State Highway 69, it showcases the Northland Fountain, Anita Gorman Park, the new North Oak Village shopping center, and the regionally popular Penguin Park. Former stars in the Vivion Road galaxy, such as Antioch Mall, have faded but show promise of brightening when long-awaited redevelopment finally gets underway.

At their January 19 First District Problem-Solving meeting, KCMO City Councilpersons Deb Hermann and Bill Skaggs hosted an overview of past and current plans for Vivion

Road. Most recent was the Briarcliff-Winnwood Area Plan which clearly pinpoints Vivion Road as one of the Northland's most significant east-west corridors. Attendees at the meeting also were briefed on an upcoming PIEA (Planned Industrial Expansion Authority) plan that will focus on commercial development opportunities on Vivion, from Antioch Road to Hardesty. That plan will deal with development possibilities for some of Vivion Road's older commercial enclaves. The plan, sponsored by NNI, will be done by Development Initiatives of Kansas City. During NNI's annual strategic planning process, the Resource Development Committee recommended that a comprehensive listing of NNI services be regularly included in the NNI Newsletter. Most NNI services are available to Clay County or Platte County residents without charge or applications.

THE 2010 CENSUS IS BEGINNING

The first phase of the 2010 U.S. Census is underway as workers have begun verifying the addresses of households across the country. Eventually, more than 140,000 U.S. Census workers will count every person in the United States and will gather information about every person living at each address including name, age, gender, race, and other relevant data. How do you tell the difference between a U.S. Census worker and a con artist? The Better Business Bureau offers the following advice:

Census workers are currently only knocking on doors to verify address information.

If a U.S. Census worker knocks on your door, he or she will have a badge, a handheld device, a Census Bureau canvas bag, and a confidentiality notice.

Do not give your Social Security number, credit card or banking information to anyone, even if

they claim they need it for the U.S. Census.

The Census Bureau might ask for very basic financial information, such as a salary range.

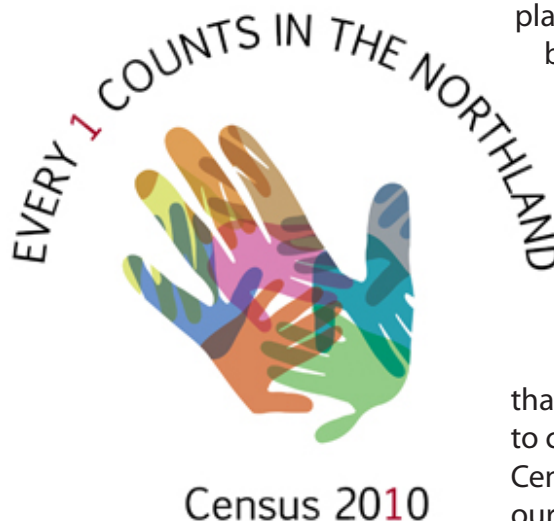
The Census Bureau will not ask for Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers, nor will employees solicit donations. Any one asking for that information is NOT with the Census Bureau.

Census workers may contact you by telephone, mail, or in person at home. However, the Census Bureau will not contact you by e-mail, so be on the lookout for e-mail scams impersonating the Census. Never click on a link or open any attachments in an e-mail that are supposedly from the U.S. Census Bureau.

The bottom line is that we all need to stand up and be counted. A complete and accurate census count is important for the Northland. Many believe the Northland has significantly gained population over the last decade. Accurate population counts provide better data for planning agencies, schools, and businesses. Kansas City and

the Northland could benefit through increased federal funding that is often tied to population. So, watch for the census information when it comes in your mailbox. It

is a simple, 10-question form that will only take a few minutes to complete and mail back to the Census Bureau. The Census: it's in our hands.



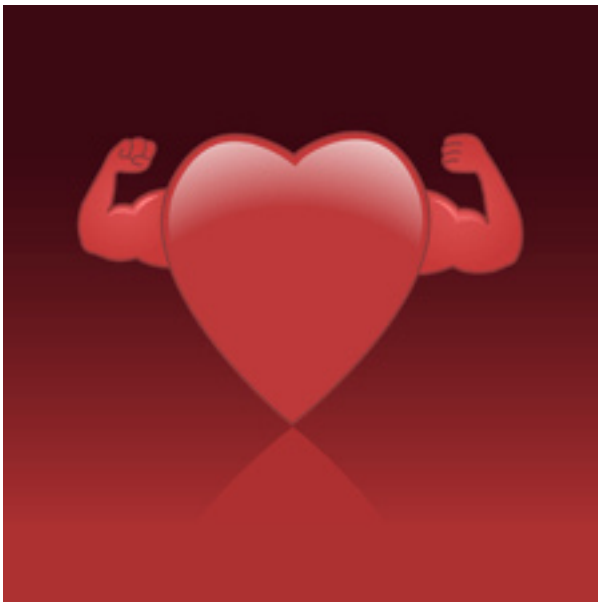
NEIGHBORHOOD CLIPS
