KCATA
Rideshare Program
Blooms This Month
In The
Northland!

The Kansas City Area
Transportation Authority (KCATA)
has partnered with a local taxi service to provide an affordable
rideshare program in the Northland. Named IRIS, this program
will be available March 15th
through an app on your phone or
computer. This rideshare service
will operate approximately 16
hours a day and has 30 dedicated
vehicles. The program is prefunded and subsidized by tax dollars.

This service will operate on a flat rate independent of the number of riders. That means a family of four using this service will pay the same rate as a single individual. Through this program, the Northland will be assigned into zones based on neighborhoods. Bus stations and depots are classified as a transit center, or hub, making this a free service to travel from your home to the bus depot. Areas such as Zona Rosa, Briarcliff, Power & Light district, and the airport are considered entertainment zones. Rates are as follows:

Transport to hub \$0

Same zone travel \$3

Zone to zone travel \$4

Entertainment zone \$10



This service is available for the Kansas City area only.
